As a Waseca native, I have many fond memories of my hometown and the artistic activities I was able to take part in. I was one of the founding members of the Waseca Art Team at the High School, lead by Jenn Popp. I remember first watercolor taking my class with Grace Galvin. The exposure to the arts I received up is responsible growing for so many of the wonderful opportunities I've been graced with throughout mγ life.

So many members of the community helped guide me on my artistic journey and instilled a life-long love for the spirit of artistic collaboration. Specifically, my senior year of high school, I remember my work being featured in the Art Center's Beckmann Gallery. The opportunity to see my work exhibited in such a professional manner was an incredibly impactful experience. It allowed me to see myself as an artist. By fostering and encouraging my fledgling work, the Art Center gave me courage to see myself as a serious creator.

When I went off to Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, I continued to create and received

scholarships from the Fine Arts and Art History Department, as well as the Theater & Dance Program. Those scholarships allowed me to partake in several theater productions, galleries, and physical theater workshops while also taking classes in fine art, dance, art history, and costume design. During my time at college, I was able to broaden my knowledge about a diverse variety of artistic traditions and developed a real passion for the intersectional ways art unites people.

Iam particularly passionate about the way language can bring people together in evocative ways. While in my sophomore year of college, where I majored English Literature minored in Gender, Women, and Sexuality Studies, I founded student organization, POETS INC. I was president of the nonprofit org until my graduation, and facilitating that community of poetic exploration was one of the most amazing experiences. Additionally, I was also a teaching assistant for the English department my senior year, assisting Professor Matt Rasmussen, winner of the 2012 Walt Whitman award, in teaching the Editing and Publishing Class. I also served as both Poetry and Associate Editor for my college's artistic and literary journal, the Firethorne, my junior and senior



years. My poems have also been featured in Z Publishing's Best Emerging Poets issue. Twice nominated for the Alexis Gerhard Award for Academic Excellence, I was never quite able to snag a win. But my final year of college I was fortunate enough to win the Lawrence Owens Prize for Creative Writing with a collection of my poetry entitled "Angel in the House / Witch in the Wood."

To all my teachers, professors, and community members, thank you for the lessons and skills I have learned over the years. Because of these influences, I have flourished as an artist and creator. I look forward to giving back to my community and enriching my home town as your new programs coordinator.


Boats sail on the rivers, And ships sail on the seas; But clouds that sail across the sky Are prettier than these.



FROM THE DIRECTOR

ANDREW BRECK / EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Where do some of your favorite pictures come from?

My grandparents have been always been a special party of my life. While growing up they were second parents and sometimes I spent more time with them than my working primary parents. I'd wake up extra early every Sunday morning and walk three houses to my grandparents to begin our weekend ritual of delivering the Star Tribune with my grandma [mind you, we had combine the papers which were printed in advance with the headlines which were delivered later - which sometimes came late Saturday evening but mostly arrived around 5:00AM on the day of delivery]. Whether rain, snow or beautiful sunrises, the best part about Sunday mornings was breakfast! Hardees or McDonalds were my options after visiting a fluctuating number of SE and NE subscribers.

In the summer my grandpa drove me around with a lawnmower in the back of his pickup chauffeuring me to my mowing engagements. He hired me when I could push a wheelbarrow with a heavy load of saturated cakey cement, and carry 8" CMUs [concrete block]. I worked with him until he wasn't able to.

He was a mason in the summer and cracked walnuts and made wood burnings in the winter... when he wasn't ice fishing on Clear Lake or at Happy Chef with a cloud of smoke around his head, while hot coffee was poured for him and the other regulars.

On my 19th birthday he gave me the most unique gift I've ever received:

It was late morning – I went up to his room and visited with him. I told him about my week but wanted to share more with him than that – there are always more important things to talk about in these moments. I sat in silence for a while and

made up a story about seeing a doe with two fawns prancing around the dappled shadows of a pink sunset whilst driving near seventy-four acres of my families' farmland we'd returned to nature.

I held his hand and told him I loved him and that it was ok to go today, then he squeezed my hand. Other than his grip, and the gurgle in his lungs, one would have glanced over his transparency; easily mistaken for a cloud of sterile white cotton sheets. He had liked driving throughout the county on gravel roads, stopping to watch and photograph birds and fowl, landscapes, sunsets and his favorite subject: deer.

I came home and had lunch – I didn't want to watch and wait. Most all of my family was at the hospital while I dined alone in the dappled shade from a deep summer day. I had promised my great-grandma someone would personally let her know. I was on my way back to the hospital when my dad phoned and informed me I didn't need to come back, so I changed course.

I didn't have to say anything. I'll never forget the primitive howl she made after opening the door and glancing into her eyes; the sound a mother makes when she loses her child – loses her first love.

Often we look back at some of the hardest moments we've rose above as some of the most valuable.

That evening we got together as a family; I opened the gift from my grandpa last: it was a wood burning he had been working on that I didn't know he had finished and personalized before passing. The image burned into the slice of wood is still as vivid as the memories now burned into my mind; when I glance at it I picture him on a winter day, looking up from his creation and smiling.

- 1. We experienced the most horrible winter ever that made commuting very difficult for Carroll, and
- 2. The discovery of an Art Center in Waseca.

The idea of an art center was very enticing. With an "empty nest" I had finally reached a stage in my life where I could pursue my love of art that had been put aside for many years. I spent one weekend surveying Waseca, and I liked what I saw. We had driven through town many times before and always thought it looked like a nice place, but I never dreamed we would call it home. One look at the Art Center, small as it was, clinched it for me. We moved here in 1998.

It didn't take long for me to get involved at WAC.

I discovered a group of women who met each Wednesday morning to do art. I was a little reluctant to join at first because I thought my artistic talents would be pretty inferior to the others, but I soon discovered the important thing was that they all loved art and enjoyed creating it. The Wednesday women became my first friends in our new town.

We have lived here over 21 years, and I still look forward to Wednesday mornings with my art friends. We draw, paint either at the center or outside (in good weather) and explore different artists or style. We meet from 11:00AM -12:30PM every Wednesday. Most of all, we have fun.

Joellen Preston has been offering classes and quality arts experiences for over 20 years. She is an independent/for contract Art Educator and provides art mentorship for adults and youth. She works one-on-one or in groups to develop art-making skills and foster creative expression.

In addition to community connections, Joellen worked with Mankato Lifeworks as the Visual Arts Coordinator. She created programming for developmentally disabled individuals, as well as her position within the company. Her art sessions were held daily and included producing work for quarterly public art exhibitions and local art fairs. She coordinated artist-clients and staff to provide community interaction opportunities to share their love of art.

Joellen also worked as the art instructor for Kato Public Charter School in Mankato. She designed a brand-new curriculum based on state educational standards, which also presented unique and challenging art techniques. Her classes and workshops have been hosted by numerous Art Centers and Community Organizations/Non-Profits: Waseca Art Center; Arts Center of St. Peter; Twin Rivers Council for the Arts; Emy Frentz Arts Guild; Red Rock Center for the Arts; Children's Science Museum of Southern Minnesot; Eagle Lake Girl Scouts; Mankato, Eagle Lake, Le Sueur Community Education and Recreation.
